





# CHW Advocacy Coalition: Overview of the Legislative Process

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### **Three Branches of Government**

The Executive Branch: The Governor and his Agencies and Departments

The Legislative Branch: The Connecticut General Assembly, composed of the State House of Representatives and State Senate

The Judicial Branch: System of State Courts



### **Executive Branch**

#### **Governor Ned Lamont**

- Elected in 2018 and re-elected in 2022
- Proposes a budget
- Appoints commissioners and other agency heads
- Sets the vision

#### Other executive branch agencies of note:

- Department of Social Services
- Department of Public Health
- Department of Mental Health & Addiction Services
- Office of Policy & Management



# Legislative Branch

#### **State House of Representatives:**

- 151 members, each representing approximately
   23,000 people
- Serve 2-year terms
- Currently: 101-49, Democratic control

#### **State Senate:**

- 36 members, each representing approximately 100,000 people
- Serve 2-year terms
- Currently: 25-10, Democratic control


### How a Bill Becomes a Law

- Concepts are introduced by legislators and the governor and crafted into bills. They will be either House bills or Senate bills.
- Bills are assigned to the most relevant legislative committee. Committees are "joint" committees.
- You can call, email, or write to your legislators with your opinions about bills.
- Committees determine what bills will be raised for public hearing.
- Public hearings are an opportunity to voice your opinion in front of relevant committees.



# More about Public Hearings

- The legislative bulletin is published daily and includes information about public hearings. Information must be published 5 days prior to the hearing.
- Instructions are in the bulletin about how to sign up to speak and/or submit written "testimony."
- Your written testimony can be one paragraph, or several pages – up to you!
- Spoken (oral) testimony is limited to three minutes.
   Legislators may then ask questions (or not).
- Usually, the first hour of a hearing is reserved for Commissioners and other public officials.
- There are options to provide oral testimony remotely or in person.



### What's next?

- After a public hearing, bills are eligible for a Committee vote up until the Committee's deadline.
- You can still call, email, or write to your legislators about the bill – even after the public hearing!
- The Committee can pass the bill as-is, amend it, or let it die. It can pass it to another Committee or straight to the House or Senate (depending on the bill number).
- The House or Senate decides whether or not to vote on that bill.
- Once a bill passes one chamber, it is sent to the other chamber.
- If it passes both chambers, it is sent to the governor for his signature.



## **Important Dates**

- January 8: Session begins, Committees begin meeting
- February 5: Governor's budget proposal is released
- February 11-26(?): Appropriations Committee public hearings on governor's budget proposal
- February-April: Committees have public hearings on policy ideas proposed by the governor and by legislators
- June 4: End of session
- July 1: Start of state fiscal year

#### **Committee deadlines of note:**

- Human Services: March 20
- Appropriations: April 25

# **Getting Involved**

- Learn who your legislators are!
- Develop a relationship with them. Call or email them, invite them to visit your organization, ask for a meeting!
- Make sure they leave with an understanding of your issue and know what your ask is.
- Provide testimony (written and oral) at public hearings.
- Be in touch with them "off session," when they have more time.
